# Hale Kākou Program Helps Family Move into Permanent Housing



Deidra is a single mother of a 16 year old son who moved to Hawaii from South Carolina. Deidra began looking for work before she moved to Hawaii and had an interview scheduled with the Department of Education to work as an Administrative Clerk before she even set foot on the island. Confident in her ability to get the job, Deidra and her son were able to temporarily move in with her daughter and son-in-law on Kaneohe Marine Base. Deidra was quickly offered the job, but could not start working until a background check was complete.

At the end of November, Deidra came into the Windward District Service Center for help. Military regulations stated that she could no longer stay with her daughter and son-in-law on base but her background check was still not complete. She had no income to pay

for another place to live, but staying with her daughter would jeopardize their stability. Staff referred her to several shelters, and she and her son moved into the Institute of Human Services. HCAP staff also assisted her with job leads and support services in case the school job did not work out. At the beginning of December, Deidra was fi-

## "The Street Store" Comes to Waianae

In December, members of The Yoke, a yoga organization, sent volunteers to set up a shop to provide clothes for the homeless via a national program called "The Street Store." In collaboration with the Leeward District Service Center and HCAP Head Start, homeless residents throughout the Leeward Coast were invited to "shop" for clothes a few days before the Christmas holiday. The shoppers received the clothing and accessories at no cost. Fred Saunders, HCAP Leeward District Council Member, assisted with the collaboration after having worked with the homeless population for years. He shared, "this is a national pro-



gram that I believed would benefit the Leeward District, since it is a need for the homeless in the Waianae area."

# **HCAP Continues Partnership with Work Furlough Programs**



HCAP's Central District Service Center and the Kalihi-Palama District Service Center staff recently met with the counseling staff and management from the Module 20 and Laumaka work furlough programs to discuss ongoing partnerships.

Both District Service Centers have been working with the work furlough programs for over ten years, providing much needed services and support to participants who are transitioning back into the community.

Each participant is enrolled into the Na Lima Hana Employment Core Services program and is offered employment preparation and job development activities. These activities includes pre-employment training, career goal planning, understanding job applications, how to prepare and dress for an interview, what to expect at an interview, mock interview sessions, budgeting, basic computer skills (Microsoft Word, Excel), resume building and job placement to unemployed and underemployed individuals.

Participants are also assisted with transportation, hygiene products, purchasing work-related items, filling their taxes, applying for health care coverage, program incentives and most recently HCAP's new Hale Kākou-Rent, Deposit, and Utility Assistance Program.



# Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program Students Visit the Honolulu Zoo



In December, the Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program went on a field trip to the Honolulu Zoo. The excursion was sponsored by the Elks Club 616 and HCAP. There were 50 students and 17 parents in attendance. Students explored the Zoo's 42 acre home to 905 different animals. Komodo Dragons, orangutans, elephants, primates, birds, reptiles, amphibians, and a variety of African animals can be seen daily. The students discovered that animals have different habitats; some live in grasslands areas, some live in water and others live both in water and on land. They

also learned that animals are categorized into three varieties of eaters: herbivores are plant eaters, carnivores are meat eaters, and omnivores are both meat & plant eaters.

In addition, students were able to participate in three grade level encounters. The students in K-2nd grade visited the Keiki zoo, where they were able to pet a domestic guinea pig and ferret. The 3rd and 4th graders visited the gharials (also known as the gavial, and the fish-eating crocodile) that live in deep, clear, fast-moving pools. Gharials primarily eat fish and aquatic frogs. The 5th -8th graders visited the Galapagos tortoise; students discovered that the oldest tortoise at the zoo was over 100 years old. They learned that the Galapagos tortoise is an herbivore (plant eater) and lives on volcanic archipelagos. Students were able to rub the head and neck of the tortoise. They learned that the zoo grows most of the food for the tortoises.


# **Head Start Children Participate in #Giving Tuesday**

# **Kupuna Independent Life Series Demonstrates Healthy Eating and Exercise**





The Kupuna Independent Life Series takes place twice a year, in the fall and spring for 13 consecutive weeks. Each workshop consists of free breakfast, exercise, health workshop topic, free lunch, support group, and crafts. Health and social education are taught by nursing students, nurse practitioners, community health advocates, and staff members. This past fall, the Kupuna Independent Life Series took place in the following communities: Windward, Kalihi, Leeward, and Leahi.

In October, Project DANA's Mike Hirano gave a presentation on Fall Prevention for Leahi District Service

Center's Kupuna Independent Life Series at Wisteria Vista. Factors for kupuna falls include blocked walkways, poor lighting, and vision problems. Everyday household items such as rugs or wires could also cause kupuna to trip and fall. Walkways in the kitchen or bathroom should be clear to avoid falling. Rooms with poor lighting should be re-evaluated to ensure that kupuna are able to see when they enter. Mike also emphasized that kupuna should get their eyes checked if they have trouble seeing. Having good vision is helpful in preventing falls.

In mid-October, Kalihi-Palama District Service Center's Kupuna Independent Life Series ushered in its third week of the six-week unit on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education (SNAP-Ed). SNAP-Ed provides practical nutrition education for Hawai'i's low-income households. The program emphasized the importance of healthy diet and exercise. In previous sessions, topics such as "Safe Food Handling" and a "Food Guide" of healthy foods were covered. This week they learned about "Spending Less, Eating Better."

On November 1st, Windward District Service Center held its eighth Kupuna Independent Life Series Program session. A special team from Hawai'i Pacific Health assisted the kupuna by testing their blood pressure, blood sugar, and cholesterol levels. Pali Momi Medical Center's Executive Chef Daniel Kahaloumi and Dietetic Intern Marissa Ono conducted a cooking demonstration of salad. After consuming the salad, Hawai'i Pacific Health's Jason Jones demonstrated band exercises, stretching movements that keep our bodies limber. All seventeen kupuna went home with a gift basket that contained a salad kit, recipes, and health scorecards to take to their doctors if they choose.

On December 1st, Leeward District Service Center's Kupuna Independent Life Series celebrated their 4th annual Kupuna Prom. Faithful to the "Oldies but Goodies" theme, kupuna dressed up in 50's and 60's attire. Kupuna, HPU nursing students, and HCAP staff attended. There was a penny sale, where kupuna could buy household items, shoes, clothing, and gifts for their loved ones. Among the highlights were warm good-byes given to HPU Professor Johnson who has accepted a new position, the heartfelt thank you from kupuna, and an old fashioned game of Hot Potato. It was the perfect ending to the 2016 Kupuna Independent Life Series.






