Leeward District Service Center Hosts Third Annual Houseless Feeding and Community Service Day









On Tuesday, December 19th, HCAP's Leeward District Service Center, in collaboration with HCAP Head Start, held its Third Annual Houseless Feeding and Community Service Day. The tradition for this event began when HCAP Head Start Cluster 1 Family Advocates took residence at the Leeward District and began to collaborate on various community projects.

The preparation for this event started early in December when Head Start Family Advocate Alice Lenchanko received donations of 21 turkeys and two 50 lb. bags of rice, along with cases of corn, from Anela and Vincent Arquinez. Leeward District Service Center Community Worker Lana Ulu took on the responsibility of preparing the turkeys in an imu at Timoteo Farms in Waianae on December 16th and 17th with the help of family members.

family members and Head Start Family Advocates cooked and prepared plate lunches. Over 300 plates were prepared with kalua turkey, rice, corn salad and mochi balls. The plate lunches were then delivered, via caravan, to homeless encampments from Nanakuli to Waianae, in known and hidden areas of the coast, where many unsheltered homeless families live. Na Lima Hana Participant Obtains Multiple Jobs

Andrea came to the Leeward District Service Center seeking employment assistance. She was referred to the Na Lima Hana Employment Core Services (ECS) Program, where she used all the training and benefits of the Job Readiness Training (JRT) to prepare herself for employment.

Andrea updated her resume, brushed up on interview tips and skills, and obtained a bus pass to help her find employment. Her hard



work paid off, resulting in two employment offers: a clerk position and a housekeeping position. As a working client of the ECS Program, Andrea received work clothes and shoes to help get her off to a successful start.

As of today, Andrea has maintained employment for over 90 days and continues to work two jobs. She is grateful for all the skills and support she has received, and says her rewarding experience with the Leeward District Service Center played an important role in her employment success.

Early Head Start Program Accepting Applications

HCAP Head Start's Early Head Start program provides home-based child development and family support services to low-income families with infants and toddlers, and to low-income pregnant women and their families. The home visitor meets with the child and family in the comfort of their own home for 1 1/2 hours each week. A home visitor encourages good parenting practices, teaches parenting skills, and provides lessons to promote parent-child interactions

The program, which began on October 1st, is still accepting applications for infants and toddlers, ages 0-3 years, who are based in the Windward and Central areas on Oahu. STEM Students Compete in FIRST LEGO League Robotics

Students from the Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program stepped up to the challenge in the island wide FIRST LEGO League (FLL) robotics competition. The Palamatrons and Halawatrons competed at Le Jardin Academy on Friday, November 10th, while the rest of the teams (Palolobots, Ka'alabots, and Ko'olaubots) competed at the locations nearest to their respective STEM Exploration Center on Saturday, November 11th.

Each year, the FLL introduces a new theme for the competition. Hydrodynamics was the theme this year, and students were presented with a series of hydrodynamic missions for the robot to complete. In addition, the students also had to complete a research project that focused on the local impact of hydrodynamics in our man made water cycle. During the competition, teams were judged on their understanding of the FLL Core Values and asked how they could exhibit the Core Values in real life scenarios. Overall, it was a great learning experience for the students, as they were finally able to showcase their months of hard work, perseverance, and commitment to their robotics teams!

SCSEP Participant Breaks the Cycle of Living Paycheck to Paycheck



Keith came to the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) in August 2016 after being referred by the State of Hawaii Unemployment Office. His wife retired as an elementary school teacher and Keith held several odd jobs in real estate, landscaping, security, and newspaper delivery. Keith and his wife had been relying on Social Security benefits and accumulated credit card debt over the years. Due to their financial hardships, Keith needed to return to the workforce; he was able to obtain stable employment with the help of the SCSEP program.

Since his enrollment in SCSEP, Keith is no longer living paycheck to paycheck. He is currently assigned to HCAP's Kalihi-Palama District Service Center as a groundskeeper. Keith's primary responsibility is to keep the lawn area clean and landscaped. He also helps to keep the office windows,

walkways, and interior and exterior areas clean. In addition, Keith helps his fellow co-workers with the Ohana Produce food distribution to the Kalihi community. Today, the HCAP Kalihi-Palama District Service Center and the community really enjoy having Keith being a part of the HCAP team.

WAP Client Receives New Refrigerator and Solar Water Heater

Charlotte is a mother of three, residing with her adult children in Waianae. She initially sought assistance from HCAP when she received a disconnection notice from her electricity provider. With the help of HCAP's

Leeward District Service Center, Charlotte completed her application for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Her household electricity was restored once the LIHEAP application was processed and the Emergency Crisis Intervention (ECI) credit kicked in. When Charlotte's refrigerator and water heater broke down, the Leeward District Service Center staff referred her to another HCAP program – the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).

Through WAP's audit and services, Charlotte received a new solar water heater and a new refrigerator, along with energy efficient devices. Charlotte remains grateful for WAP. For months, Charlotte and her children had to live with the inconvenience of cold water for their showers and lack of refrigeration for their groceries. Now, they can live comfortably again. HCAP's WAP staff would like to thank C&J Solar Solutions for installing Charlotte's solar water heater.




