Employment Program Helps Seniors Maintain Independence

HCAP has been administering and providing the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) to low-income seniors for over four decades. Annually, SCSEP serves approximately 148 senior citizens. The primary functions of the SCSEP program are two-fold: to provide meaningful part-time subsidized "hands-on" training to low-income seniors aged 55 and older; and to assist program participants in finding unsubsidized jobs in the community.

Pearl has been a SCSEP worker since 2011. She moved to the Waianae Coast, from the Windward side of the island in 2009. Shortly after moving, Pearl began volunteering at the Leeward District Service Center's Ohana Produce food distributions. Val Tavai, Leeward District

Service Center Manager suggested that Pearl apply to SCSEP. Upon admittance to the program, Pearl was placed at the Leeward District Service Center as a receptionist, working in the front office. Pearl had previously

been a cook and did not have any experience as a receptionist. Aunty Liko, who had completed her time with SCSEP, gave Pearl on the job training. Pearl learned proper business phone etiquette, how to disseminate information to the public, and basic computer skills. Currently, Pearl manages Leeward District Service Center volunteers who help with cleaning, maintenance, landscaping, and distributing food during Ohana Produce distribution. Pearl has benefited from SCSEP, as well as other program offerings from HCAP. The supplemental income has helped her to maintain her independence. Pearl enjoys staying active, through volunteering at Ohana Produce, participating in the Kupuna Independent Life Series at the Leeward District Service Center, and dancing every weekend at Rest Camp in Waianae.

Honolulu Community Action Program is a non-profit community action agency serving low-income Oahu residents. In 2013, HCAP assisted over 20,000 seniors, adults, youth & children with employment, education, housing & basic needs.



Your Helping Hand - Youth Services

HCAP Youth Services (HYS) has been fortunate to benefit from the assistance of interns from the University of Hawaii and Hawaii Pacific University, who are working on their Bachelors degree in Social Work. Interns

have been an integral part of HYS in all aspects of the program. They assist in the Competency Based Community School Diploma Program (C-Base) and tutoring classrooms, with case management, and job readiness training. They have also worked together to generate monthly group workshops for the C-Base students that are fun and interactive, and organize monthly team building activities to bring all HYS students together on test days. HYS interns bring high-energy and enthusiasm for learning as they tutor students, work in the C-Base class, and integrate theories they are learning into practice. The Youth Services staff and students are thankful to have them as part of the team!

Hā Initiative Participates at FIRST Lego League Competitions

In the months of September- December, participants of the Hā Initiative participated in FIRST Lego League robotics competitions. Three teams from HCAP participated this season: the Palamabots, from the Kalihi STEM Exploration Center; the Halawabots, from the Central STEM Exploration Center; and the Ka`alabots from the Leeward STEM Exploration Center. This year's theme was Nature's Fury – how to prepare, stay safe, and rebuild from disastrous weather events. At the Waianae District Competition, the Ka`alabots presented their project on how to combat the frequent brushfires of the Leeward Coast with a sprinkler system. Winning

favor of the judges, the Ka`alabots became the first team from HCAP to advance to the Hawai'i State Championships. With the hard work and dedication from our participants, their parents, and our staff, the Ka'alabots earned the award for Most Promising Rookie - turning heads and gathering a lot of attention as a rookie team in the competition. We are proud of all of the HCAP teams that participated in the competitions. The participants have made great progress and we are looking forward to next season.

HCAP District Councils

The District Center Advisory Councils play a unique and significant role in support of HCAP. These District Councils serve as a forum for low-income residents to discuss poverty-related issues and to voice their needs, concerns and opinions about HCAP programs and other matters. Each District Council is an organization of elected representatives who operate under by-laws approved by HCAP's Board of Directors, meets regularly, and maintains records of its meetings. They mobilize resources from both public and private agencies for use in the district, and provide input to the District Manager in planning and implementing district programs and services. Perhaps most importantly, each District Service Center Advisory Council elects an HCAP Board Representative to represent the entire District Council on the HCAP Board of Directors. This representation on the Board is an integral feature of HCAP's unique tripartite structure, whereby the public, private, and resident sectors all have an equal voice in the direction of the agency.

Board Member Installation

On Thursday, October 24, 2013, HCAP installed its Board of Directors for 2013-2014. The newly installed Board Chair is Representative Isaac W. Choy, House District 23, representing the Office of the Mayor. Representative Choy has been a HCAP board member since 2007. New directors are Jeselle Bassingthwaite, Head Start Policy Council Chair; Pauni Nagaseu-Escue resident representative of the Kalihi-Palama District; Frederick Saunders, Jr., resident representative of the Leeward District; and Alan Shinn, Executive Director of the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii. City and County of Honolulu, Department of Community Services Deputy Director, Gary Nakata, administered the oath of office. The keynote speaker for the event was Mr. Alex Santiago, LSW, Executive Director of the Hawaii Psychological Association.





HCAP Launches Social Media Campaign

HCAP began implementing its Social Media plan in November 2013, beginning with the launch of our Facebook and Twitter pages. Soon after, we began a Giving Tuesday campaign to raise program funds. #Giving Tuesday is a new day of giving added to the national calendar on the Tuesday following Thanksgiving, Black Friday, and Cyber Monday. We were able to meet our goal of raising \$1,000 and exceeded our goal of 100 followers on Twitter. We were shy of our goal of 200 "likes" on Facebook, but expect to far exceed that number in the next quarter.

- Sign waving and a Honk for Head Start campaign at 3 different locations along the Waianae Coast




