Our Programs



DISTRICT SERVICE CENTERS

HCAP operates five district service centers on Oahu to provide resources and services to low-income residents near their home communities. District Service Centers offer a variety of programs and services including, but not limited to outreach, intake, assessment, service planning, and support services. District Service Centers are encouraged to develop and implement programs specific to their community needs.



HCAP HEAD START

HCAP Head Start is a federally funded program that provides quality services to qualifying children and their families. It is comprised of the Head Start preschool program for children 3 to 5 years old and the Early Head Start program for infants, toddlers, and pregnant women.



HĀ INITIATIVE: CREATIVE STEM AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Hā Initiative is a fun and creative place for kids in grades 2 through 8 to learn and grow by exploring the worlds of Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM). The program is free and provides participants an after-school snack, tutoring, the opportunity to meet other kids, and enjoy exciting, handson science projects and computer activities.



INCOME TAX SERVICES

In partnership with the IRS and as part of the Hawaii Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) & Financial Empowerment Coalition, HCAP's Income Tax Services/ Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) program helps working families and individuals get the federal tax credits they have earned. To qualify to use our services, filers should have an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) of about \$55,000 or less and be filing a relatively simple return. The tax preparation and filing services are free of charge to those who qualify.



KUMUHONUA TRANSITIONAL LIVING CENTER

Kumuhonua is a transitional living center located at Kalaeloa, Barbers Point. Kumuhonua is for single adults and couples (18 and over) who are homeless or at-risk for homelessness. Kumuhonua provides housing, case management services and ongoing workshops and classes.



Our Programs



LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP)

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is designed to help families keep their utilities (gas or electric) on, especially those households that are most vulnerable, such as the elderly, the disabled, and households with young children. LIHEAP primarily assists households by applying an energy assistance grant directly to the energy provider on behalf of the eligible household.



NA LIMA HANA EMPLOYMENT CORE SERVICES (ECS)

Na Lima Hana "for the working hand" Employment Core Services Program provides employment preparation training, personalized case management services, and job placement to unemployed and underemployed individuals. Participants can attend workshops to develop career goals, build their resume, participate in mock interviewing, and learn basic computer skills.



SENIOR COMMUNITY SERVICE EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (SCSEP)

Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) is a federally-funded program under the Title V of the Older Americans Act. The primary functions of the SCSEP program are two-fold: To provide meaningful part-time subsidized "hands-on" training to low-income seniors aged 55 and older and to assist program participants into finding regular jobs in the community.



WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WAP)

The Weatherization Assistance Program provides education and tips, and a selection of cost-effective energy efficient measures to qualifying households to reduce their energy burden. Some of the measures may include high-efficiency faucet aerators & showerheads, LED lights, and/or an energy efficient water heater, provided free of charge.



YOUTH SERVICES

The Youth Services Program helps youth ages 16 to 24 years of age through Novanet and Individualized Tutoring with the ultimate goal of obtaining their Hawaii Adult Community School Diploma using the Competency-Based Community School Diploma Program (C-Base) developed by the Department of Education.



Agency Highlights

HCAP Recognized by Hawaii State Legislature for Homeless Initiative



In March 2017, the State House of Representatives and Senate Gallery recognized Aloha United Way and partner agencies, like HCAP for their work to combat homelessness with the Coordinated Statewide Homeless Initiative (CSHI). HCAP's Hale Kakou - Rent, Deposit, and Utility Assistance Program was a part of CSHI and offered from October 2016 to January 2017. The program dispersed \$124,234 and helped 72 individuals and families. A total of 270 men, women, and children were positively impacted from the program.

HCAP Corporate Office and HCAP Head Start Move to New Offices



In 2017, HCAP relocated both the HCAP Corporate Office and the HCAP Head Start Main Office. In the spring, HCAP Corporate Office relocated a few blocks away from the old 33 South King Street location to 1132 Bishop Street in Downtown Honolulu. In the fall, HCAP Head Start moved their Main Office to 94-810 Moloalo Street, Suites 200 & 210 in Waipahu. HCAP Head Start previously housed employees at 3 different locations, but is now able to work more efficiently under one roof.

Seattle Seahawks Player Collaborates with Hā Initiative



Michael Bennett, #72 of the Seattle Seahawks professional football team visited the Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program's Central STEM Exploration Center in July 2017. In partnership with his foundation, The Bennett Foundation, Michael and his personal chef, Steve, created a science lesson on healthy alternatives to soda. Bennett formed the Bennett Foundation with one goal in mind: eliminating childhood obesity in underserved communities around the nation. The foundation has been providing nutritional meals to three of HCAP's STEM Exploration Centers.



HCAP's Income Tax Services Brings Over \$1 Million to Our Communities



District Service Center staff and volunteers have once again made the Income Tax Services/ Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Program a success! In 2017, there were 736 filers who participated in the program at one of the five District Service Centers or the HCAP Corporate Office. More than 52% of these filers received the Earned Income Credit, realizing more than \$509K from that credit alone. Overall, the EITC Program brought back \$1,372,053 to our local families and communities. A big mahalo to our partners, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the Hawaii Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA), for all their patience and support.

Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center Receives US VETS Award



HCAP's Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center staff, Davilyn Chang and Rado Melchor, had the honor of attending the U.S. VETS Community Appreciation Luncheon held at The Willows Restaurant in September 2017. Kumuhonua received the Ka`ipu Award for their partnership with U.S. VETS. The Ka'ipu Award is given to the outstanding community agency or organization who has partnered with U.S. VETS to dedicate their time and service to veterans. Kumuhonua staff has contributed both time and service to U.S. VETS' ADVANCE Hawaii Women's Program (AHWP) as part of a collaborative mission to end homelessness among veterans.

HCAP Selects New Head Start Director



In April 2017, Grant Kogami was named HCAP's newest HCAP Head Start Director. Grant replaced Lynn Cabato, who retired after over 40 years of dedicated service to HCAP Head Start. The HCAP Head Start Director oversees all aspects of HCAP's Head Start program, providing leadership in planning, designing, implementing, and evaluating the program as set forth in the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) and Administration for Children and Families (ACF) guidelines. The HCAP Head Start Director also represents the agency in local, state, regional, and national matters pertaining to the program.





School Readiness





HCAP Head Start's goal is to prepare students to enter kindergarten. The Head Start Early Learning Framework provides a guide for children's development that is aligned with the State's DOE Kindergarten school readiness goals.

Annually, the program develops its school readiness goals using current child observations completed 3 times a year, Fall, Winter, and Spring to identify the areas showing the greatest needs for growth and also includes a section using parent input for objectives they feel is most important for their child to learn while in our program.

Family Engagement





HCAP Head Start prides itself for the comprehensive services it provides to all families participating in the program. Effective family engagement is key to developing the whole child leading to better child and family outcomes for school readiness. Family engagement focuses on the areas of nutrition, physical activity, oral health and health literacy.

Throughout the school year, Family Advocate staff partner with parents to work together to build on their strengths and overcome their challenges. Parents, as primary teacher of their children, are provided opportunities to participate in workshops and family engagement events to enhance their understanding and knowledge of family well-being.


