

HCAP Board Structure

The HCAP Board of Directors is the governing body of the organization, responsible for oversight of all affairs of HCAP.

The composition of HCAP's Board of Directors consists of a tripartite membership - one-third of the members represent the public sector, one-third of the members represent the private sector, and one-third of the members represent the resident sector.

This unique Board structure allows all voices in the community to be represented, in order to help HCAP deliver the best programs and services to the communities we serve.



Programs & Services



DISTRICT SERVICE CENTERS

HCAP operates five district service centers on Oahu to provide resources and services to low-income residents near their home communities. District Service Centers offer a variety of programs and services including, but not limited to outreach, intake, assessment, service planning, and support services. District Service Centers are encouraged to develop and implement programs specifc to their community needs.



HCAP HEAD START & EARLY HEAD START

HCAP Head Start is a federally funded program that provides quality services to qualifying children and their families. It is comprised of the Head Start pre-school program for children 3 to 5 years old and the Early Head Start program for infants, toddlers, and pregnant women.



HĀ INITIATIVE: CREATIVE STEM AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Hā Initiative is a fun and creative place for kids in grades 2 through 8 to learn and grow by exploring the worlds of Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM). The program is free and provides participants an after-school snack, tutoring, the opportunity to meet other kids, and enjoy exciting, hands- on science projects and computer activities.



INCOME TAX SERVICES

HCAP's Income Tax Services/ Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) program helps working families and individuals get the federal tax credits they have earned. To qualify to use our services, filers should have an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) of about \$55,000 or less and be filing a relatively simple return. The tax preparation and filing services are free of charge to those who qualify.



KUMUHONUA TRANSITIONAL LIVING CENTER

Kumuhonua is a transitional living center located at Kalaeloa, Barbers Point. Kumuhonua is for single adults and couples (18 and over) who are homeless or at-risk for homelessness. Kumuhonua provides housing, case management services and ongoing workshops and classes.



KUPUNA INDEPENDENT LIFE SERIES

The Kupuna Independent Life Series assists seniors 55 and older to "age in place" through health and wellness workshops, exercise, support groups, free nutritious breakfast and lunch, and more. The program is a multi-generational effort to provide seniors, age 55 and older, with health education, support for living productive independent lives, and proactive civic engagement.



LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP)

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is designed to help families keep their utilities (gas or electric) on, especially those households that are most vulnerable, such as the elderly, the disabled, and households with young children. LIHEAP primarily assists households by applying an energy assistance grant directly to the energy provider on behalf of the eligible household.



NĀ LIMA HANA EMPLOYMENT CORE SERVICES (ECS)

Na Lima Hana "for the working hand" Employment Core Services Program provides employment preparation training, personalized case management services, and job placement to unemployed and underemployed individuals. Participants can attend workshops to develop career goals, build their resume, participate in mock interviews, and learn basic computer skills.



RAPID RE-HOUSING PROGRAM

The Rapid Re-housing Program provides individuals and families who are homeless or at-risk for homelessness with case management and support needed to obtain permanent housing. Direct services include providing participants with emergency food and clothing, program referrals, as well as rental subsidies after the partipant successfully secures housing.



SENIOR COMMUNITY SERVICE EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (SCSEP)

Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) is a federally-funded program under the Title V of the Older Americans Act. The primary functions of the SCSEP program are two-fold: To provide meaningful part-time subsidized "hands-on" training to low-income seniors aged 55 and older and to assist program participants in finding regular jobs in the community.



WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WAP)

The Weatherization Assistance Program provides education and tips, and a selection of cost-effective energy efficient measures to qualifying households to reduce their energy burden. Some of the measures may include high-efficiency faucet aerators & showerheads, LED lights, and/or an energy efficient water heater, provided free of charge.

Transforming communities

TO BECOME ENERGY EFFICIENT

Christy was referred to the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) in April upon her visit to the Leeward District Service Center office. Christy lives in a multigenerational household of seven people and was looking for a program that would reduce energy costs. With her electric bills being consistently high, Leeward District Service Center's Community Worker referred Christy to WAP, a program that helps low-income households reduce energy consumption.



Christy wasted no time in gathering all the required documents needed to apply for WAP. A few weeks after submitting her application, Christy was approved for services and received a home energy audit. During the home energy audit in May, Christy found out that she was eligible to receive a new solar water heating system and an Energy Star refrigerator. Installations for both the solar water heating system and the Energy Star refrigerator were completed.

Leeward District Service Center staff also referred Christy to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) for additional assistance on her electric bill. In June, she applied for LIHEAP's Energy Credit Program. Christy also expressed interest in receiving fresh fruits and vegetables at the Leeward District Service Center's Ohana Produce food distribution. With a new baby on the way, Christy is looking for different ways to save money.

Offering Hope

FOR A BETTER FUTURE

Totha Pearl's mom Noji first came to the Central District Service Center over 14 years ago for assistance in securing employment. At that time, Noji was a single, unemployed mom, isolated from her family, not a US citizen, and unfamiliar with how to seek employment to support her daughter. Noji was introduced to HCAP through her daughter, who was enrolled in Head Start.

Noji attended Job Readiness Training classes, developed her resume, and began looking for work. Noji eventually found work at McDonald's and enjoyed being able to support her daughter.



Noji also participated in other HCAP programs and services, including Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Income Tax Services/ Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Program, and Ohana Produce.

Totha Pearl, who was first introduced to HCAP as a Head Start student, recently graduated from high school and remembered the great resources that were available to her mom throughout the years. Totha Pearl reached out to Central District Service Center for assistance with obtaining a job and was enrolled into the Na Lima Hana Employment Core Services (ECS) Program. After completing Job Readiness Training, Totha Pearl was quickly able to secure full time employment at 7-Eleven as a cashier. Totha Pearl also received a bus voucher to help with her commute to work. Although Totha Pearl is excited about obtaining work to help with her family's monthly expenses, she is even more excited about what the future may hold for her.

Walter, a senior, was forced to vacate his rental unit after his brother, who was the homeowner, decided to sell the property. With nowhere to live, Walter set up an encampment on the shores of Pearl Harbor. But following homeless encampment sweeps in the area, Walter relocated to the Hale Mauliola Navigation Center on Sand Island, where he lived in converted shipping containers.

Walter lived at Hale Mauliola and received services from the Institute for Human Services for six months before the opportunity to move into the Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center arose.

At first, Walter was reluctant about the move. He had been living in the Honolulu metropolitan area for a while and was not familiar with the Kapolei area. Not long after his entry into Kumuhonua in September 2017, Walter tested positive for kidney complications.

During his stay at Kumuhonua, Walter kept up with all of his commitments, including meeting goals set in his individual housing plan, attending case management meetings twice a month, and participating in nutrition and budgeting workshops and house meetings. Walter opened a savings account, collected Social Security Disability payments, and through careful budgeting with his case manager, he was able to save money while living at Kumuhonua.

Walter ultimately was able to increase his net worth, which opened up more housing options for him. He was able to secure permanent housing at La'iola Elderly Housing, an affordable apartment complex for seniors in Wahiawa. Walter was very excited about the move and made the proper arrangements for his transportation and dialysis treatments. On April 16th, Walter successfully moved out of Kumuhonua and into Laiola. Kumuhonua staff wishes him the best of luck in his new endeavors.





Family engagement is a collaborative and strengths-based process through which HCAP Head Start and Early Head Start professionals, families, and children build positive and goal-oriented relationships. It is a shared commitment to creating and sustaining ongoing partnerships that supports parent-child relationships which are crucial to a child's healthy development, school readiness, and well-being.

Teacher and Family Advocates plan monthly family engagement activities which provides an opportunity for families to learn more about how to effectively support children's growth and development across the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework domains.

Family Engagement





HCAP Head Start & Early Head Start provides a comprehensive curriculum that prepares children for kindergarten. My Teaching Strategies, Head Start Early Learning Framework and Hawaii Early Learning Development Standards all align to provide developmentally appropriate practices to be kindergarten ready.

HCAP Head Start & Early Head Start gathered data from Teacher observations, Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS), My Teaching Strategies and parent input which provided outcomes for the school readiness goals. Through this data, teaching staff were able to create specific goals and objectives for each individual child while in enrolled in the program.




