## HCAP, Department of Health, and Nonprofit Partners Work Together to Vaccinate Rural O'ahu Communities

In April 2021, in an effort to increase COVID-19 vaccination rates among rural Oʻahu communities, a free vaccination event was held at the Honolulu Community Action Program, Inc. (HCAP) Head Start program's Kunia campus. The event aimed to vaccinate agricultural

State Department of Health, the Native Hawaiian & Pacific Islander Hawaiii COVID-19 Response, Recovery, and Resilience Team, and Project Vision Hawaiii. A majority of the participants came from rural, low-income, and immigrant communities of Oʻahu that have been hit hardest by the pandemic.

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HCAP Executive Director Robert N.E. Piper shared that these communities often face "language barriers and limited transportation access...which make getting vaccinated a difficult if not impossible process," and that through these collaborations with state agencies and nonprofit organizations, "we are better able to reach out to and vaccinate O'ahu residents who may have otherwise struggled to find access and services to accommodate their needs."



Honolulu Community Action Program, Inc. is a non-profit community action agency serving low-income Oahu residents. In 2020, HCAP assisted over 20,000 seniors, adults, youth & children with employment, education, housing & basic needs.



## Journey to Recovery: HCAP Client Finds Employment, Maintains Sobriety, and Regains Her Confidence

Natalie was first introduced to Honolulu Community Action Program, Inc. (HCAP) through Poʻailani, Inc., a nonprofit in Kāneʻohe that provides dual diagnosis treatment services for substance abuse disorders and mental illnesses. After learning what HCAP had to offer during a virtual presentation from our Windward District Service Center staff, Natalie immediately reached out and was enrolled in the Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services (ECS) Program.

In the weeks that followed, Natalie worked closely with the Windward Community Services Specialist to create a resume, prepare for interviews, and explore different employment options. She was anxious as she had been dealing with many struggles in life and was now learning to regain her self confidence and reintegrate back into society.



Natalie's main focus was to maintain her sobriety, continue with her treatment plan, and attend all her meetings at Poʻailani. Because of these challenges, Natalie was facing several barriers while trying to find employment. Her State I.D. had been lost, her hours of availability for work were limited due to her treatment meetings, and finding a good fit for her vulnerable situation was also a challenge. However, HCAP's Windward Community Services Specialist and Natalie were able to work together to strategize a plan of action, and also obtain Natalie's State I.D. through online and mail-in services.

Natalie put in a lot of hard work and submitted her resume and several employment applications. After a few weeks of job searching, Natalie notified our Windward Community Services Specialist that she had obtained employment as a part-time Market Researcher. The job fit her needs and time schedule and Natalie was very excited to get started. With the help of the Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Service Program, Natalie was also able to receive work attire to make her feel confident when starting her new job.

Natalie still has a long journey ahead of her to reach recovery and self-sufficiency, but she now has a plan of action and an amazing outlook on life. Natalie has the support of the team at Poʻailani and HCAP's Windward District Service Center, which will help her maintain her mental health, sobriety, and newfound employment. With her team on her side, Natalie will have access to the resources and care that she needs to continue to thrive. Natalie is so very grateful and motivated for what is ahead of her.

Natalie's story truly defines the meaning of "Community Action". It's about working together as a community, building a team, uplifting an individual, starting where the person is at, taking it one step at a time, and knowing that every little bit of effort or "action" will make a big difference in that person's life.

# HCAP Head Start and Early Head Start Program Returns to In-Person Learning

This spring, the HCAP Head Start and Early Head Start program returned to the classroom for inperson learning after over a year of remote services. The federally-funded Head Start program has been providing early education services to low-income families on Oʻahu since 1965.

HCAP Head Start Director Grant Kogami is proud that the program was able to adapt and excel at delivering remote services in the past year, but shared that both staff and families are happy to be back in the classroom: "The children and families have been more than patient and understanding. Now it is our turn to show our gratitude by providing them with the in-person services they need and deserve."

The preparation to welcome the students back to in-person learning has been extensive, with the continued health and safety of the children, staff, families, and community at-large as a top priority.



An 'Ewa-area Head Start parent shared that "[the Head Start staff] did a great job of explaining the policies and procedures to us, including maintaining six-foot distance and sanitizing," and that her child was excited to return to school with these measures in place.

To spread the word about the new school year, HCAP Head Start staff shared information about the program throughout the community, at housing complexes, shelters, clinics, and local businesses. Approximately 4,000 applications for the 2021-2022 school year were distributed through their efforts.







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## Hā Initiative Students Dissect Crayfish!



The Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program is back in the classroom with exciting, hands-on activities for the particiants. In June, students had the opportunity to dissect crayfish provided by Carolina's Young Scientist Crayfish Dissection Kit!

During the dissection, students located and identified the crayfish's external and internal features. Students also learned that crayfish were first introduced into taro patches near Ahuimanu Stream in 1923, and that in the 1940s, crayfish were considered pests to taro cultivation as their burrows can cause the draining of loʻi. "My favorite part was finding the gills on the crayfish!" said Manany, a Hā Initiative student. Manany is interested in learning more about biology and hopes to get a STEM related job so that she can help provide for her family.

The students had fun during the dissection while learning about the natural environment and biology. This type of educational, fun, and handson lesson is why we love having our keiki back in the classroom!



## Single Mother Works Toward Self-Sufficiency Following Pandemic Job Loss

Jaime first contacted the Central District Service Center for assistance with past-due rent after being furloughed from her job amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. Like many other local residents who lost their jobs in the past year, Jaime scrambled to file for unemployment benefits only to face long wait times as the state struggled to handle a growing backlog of applications.

Along with rental assistance, Jaime also expressed interest in employment opportunities and was referred to the Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services Program. Central District Service Center staff provided her with information on vocational training programs that could lead Jaime into a new career path.

After considering all of her options, Jaime decided to enroll in Phlebotomy courses through the Hawai'i Medical Training Center. "One advantage of the program," Jaime explained, "is that classes are offered at



convenient times that allow me to still be a mother and attend school without overextending myself."

Recently, Jaime passed the National Healthcareer Association (NHA) Phlebotomy exam, earning her Phlebotomy Certificate. Jaime also shared that she plans to continue her education while working as a phlebotomist by earning further healthcare certifications: "It would open up doors for more employment options in the future, as I would be certified in multiple healthcare fields, giving me that competitive edge on my job applications," she said, "My future goal is to be able to provide for me and my children without the need of government agencies. To be self-sufficient and a positive, contributing member to society."

HCAP Central District Service Center staff will continue to support Jaime in her future career endeavors.

## HCAP Contributes \$50,000 to HomeAid Hawai'i to Support Permanent Housing for Homeless in Kalaeloa

On April 8th, Honolulu Community Action Program, Inc. (HCAP) presented a check for \$50,000 to HomeAid Hawai'i. This contribution through CARES Act funds will support the development of Kamaʻokū, a masterplanned community in Kalaeloa providing permanent housing for homeless individuals - a population left increasingly vulnerable by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Kamaʻokū is the first kauhale of its kind and will include 36 tiny homes, along with a community center, multipurpose gathering space, and community farming area. HCAP's contribution will be used to weatherize the tiny homes to make them more energy-efficient.

Davilyn Chang, Program Manager at HCAP's Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center, presented the check to Nani Medeiros, Executive Director of HomeAid Hawai'i, during a visit to the Kama'okū site.



Following the presentation, Nani led Davilyn and the other HCAP staff in attendance on a tour of the construction site, where they were able to see inside one of the 90 square foot, single occupant homes.

HCAP Executive Director Robert N.E. Piper stated, that "HCAP stands proudly with HomeAid Hawaii and all of its supporters on this kauhale, which represents the first building block of many more to come in our unified battle to end homelessness in our community."




