STEM Students Shine at Statewide Robotics Competition

On Saturday, December 3rd, the Ha Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program competed at the Hawai'i First Robotics State Competition at the Blaisdell Center in Honolulu. A total of six HCAP teams from four STEM Exploration Centers entered the First Lego League competition, including three Explore teams and three Challenge teams. The Explore teams consist of students ages 6 to 10 and focus on the fundamentals of engineering as they explore real-world problems and learn to design, code, and create unique solutions. The Challenge teams consist of students ages 9 to 16 and engage in research, problem-solving, coding, and engineering through building and programming a LEGO robot that navigates the missions of a robot game.

The Hā Initiative's Challenge Team from Ka'iulani STEM Exploration Center placed 8th out of 51 teams competing in the robot games from across the state. The Explore Teams from both Ka'iulani and Windward STEM Exploration Centers were also honored for their Team Model Builds and Lincoln STEM Exploration Center's Explore Team was honored for Team Poster Design.

Just days before the competition, the Explore Team from Lincoln STEM Exploration Center was unsure if they would be competing at all. The team usually consists of only two members, and one of the students was unable to attend the state competition that weekend. Fortunately, FIRST Lego League would allow the remaining member, Alexis, to compete alone on her team's behalf. Though she was nervous and had only two days left before the competition, Alexis agreed to present their project to the judges on her own. Her teammate and coaches helped her prepare a speech and get comfortable with delivering the entire presentation about the team poster, team model, and core values.



During the event, each team presents in front of the judges without coaches or parents present. When Alexis came out of the judging room, she was excited to share that she was so comfortable presenting and answering the judges' questions that she did not even need her notes. Thanks to Alexis' hard work, her team was honored for best team poster. She was also awarded the FIRST Lego League Explorer medal for attending the competition. Windward Client Surpasses Employment Milestones



Shay Boy came to HCAP's Windward District Service Center for assistance with her job search. Staff assessed Shay Boy's situation and connected her with resources from HCAP to overcome her employment barriers. She enrolled in the Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services Program, and staff guided her through goal setting, resume writing, and Job Readiness Training, to make sure she was ready for applications and interviews. Shay Boy's preparation paid off when she applied to Tropical Farms and was hired right away!

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She received employment attire and hygiene supplies from Nā Lima Hana for her first day on the job. Shay Boy has since completed 90 days of employment at Tropical Farms. Staff continues to follow up with her weekly, as well as provide gift card incentives as she completes her employment milestones. Shay Boy has also been participating in the Rent To Work Program, preparing her for the transition to affordable, independent housing. Staff are proud of Shay Boy's positive attitude and progress throughout her challenging journey. "I appreciate you," Shay Boy told the staff. "Thank you all so much for all the help!"

HCAP Delivers 16 Refrigerators to Kūpuna This Holiday Season



WAP staff was on-site to assist kūpuna with the process and gift the residents with goodie bags filled with hygiene supplies as a little token of holiday cheer. The residents were overjoyed to receive their new energy-saving refrigerators, especially during the holiday season and as the cost of electricity has increased. Keeping up with household utility bills is significant and a key component of self-sustainability. It is the hope of HCAP and the WAP team to enable more individuals and families to have energy-efficient homes.

HCAP's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) team kicked off the holidays with a mass delivery of refrigerators to residents at the Hale Mohalu senior apartments. Nearly 30 qualifying seniors received services from WAP, an energy-efficiency initiative that assists residents in reducing the cost of their utility expenses by creating energy-efficient homes. In total, 29 seniors received services with 16 residents being eligible for brand-new energy star refrigerators!

HCAP Head Start & Early Head Start gave back to fellow organizations supporting families in need this Giving Tuesday. Donations included food, clothing, toiletries, and school supplies. Throughout the month of November, HCAP staff donated canned goods, bottled water, and other food items to deliver to River Of Life Mission on Tuesday, November 29.

Engineering with the Hā Initiative

The Ha Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program students at the Lincoln STEM Exploration Center enjoyed an engineering project to build the tallest possible lego building without exceeding a base width of 4 inches. The building had to stand alone without assistance for at least 10 seconds. Students worked in teams and added blocks as they built up, trying not to let their building fall within a 30-minute time constraint. The classroom groups worked together to make decisions, modifying their towers as they went. The activity was met with students' enthusiasm and the competition results were close. The tallest building was recorded at 51.5 inches from the base and the second tallest was at 49 inches!




