
As a Community Action Agency, HCAP's mission is rooted in responsiveness to the community and its needs.





# **PROGRAMS & SERVICES**

#### **HEAD START & EARLY HEAD START**

Head Start is a federally funded program that provides quality services to qualifying children and their families. From our humble beginning as a summer project in 1965, we have grown to become the largest early childhood program in the State of Hawaii serving over 1,500 children and their families each year. HCAP Head Start is comprised of the Head Start preschool program for children 3 to 5 years old and the Early Head Start program for infants, toddlers, and pregnant women.





#### HĀ INITIATIVE: CREATIVE STEM AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Hā Initiative is a fun and creative place for kids in grades 2 through 8 to spend their after-school time. Through this program, kids learn and grow by exploring the worlds of Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM). The program is free and provides participants snacks, tutoring, and an opportunity to meet other kids and engage in exciting hands-on science projects and computer activities. They can also join a LEGO League robotics team!

# NĀ LIMA HANA - EMPLOYMENT CORE SERVICES PROGRAM

Nā Lima Hana "for the working hand" Employment Core Services Program provides personalized one-one-one employment counseling services, job readiness training, tuition assistance for vocational school, and job placement to unemployed and underemployed individuals throughout the island of O'ahu.



# **PROGRAMS & SERVICES**

#### **KUMUHONUA TRANSITIONAL LIVING CENTER**

Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center is located at Kalaeloa, Barbers Point. Kumuhonua is for single adults and couples (18 and over) who are homeless or at risk for homelessness. Kumuhonua provides housing, case management services, and ongoing workshops and classes. All referrals and applications for Kumuhonua are now provided through the State of Hawaii Coordinated Entry System (CES).




#### WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) can help lowincome households reduce their energy consumption and costs. This is achieved through a home energy audit plus household-specific energy efficiency tips and education, and a selection of cost-effective energy efficient measures. Some of those measures may include high-efficiency faucet aerators & shower heads, compact fluorescent lighting (CFL) or Light Emitting Diode lighting (LED), and/or an energy-efficient solar water heater, all provided free of charge.

# LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY & WATER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP/LIHWAP)

LIHEAP is designed to help families keep their utilities (gas or electric) on, especially those households that are most vulnerable, such as the elderly, the disabled, and households with young children. LIHEAP primarily assists households by applying an energy assistance grant directly to the energy provider on behalf of the eligible household through either the Energy Credit (EC) or, for households that have a notice of disconnection from the utility company, the Energy Crisis Intervention (ECI).



# **PROGRAMS & SERVICES**

#### **INCOME TAX SERVICES**

In partnership with the IRS and the Hawai'i Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Financial Empowerment Coalition, HCAP's Income Tax Services and Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Program helps working families and individuals get the federal tax credits they have earned. In 2019, over \$1.2 million was brought back into the local community through this program.



#### **KŪPUNA INDEPENDENT LIFE SERIES**

The Kūpuna Independent Life Series is a comprehensive approach to assisting seniors, age 55+ with health education, support for living productive independent lives, and proactive engagement with the 'Wai'anae community.

The series is held twice a year through the Leeward District Service Center.

#### KÖKUA FOOD ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Funded through the Community Services Block Grant CARES Act Federal Funds, HCAP is providing food assistance to eligible individuals and households impacted by COVID-19 through loss of employment, reduction of work hours, or other pandemic-related challenges. This program provides grocery cards (gift cards), grocery boxes, and a food pantry for emergency food assistance for eligible individuals and families.



# PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

#### Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services

#### Mother of Five Pursues Education to Become a Better Role Model

Sheena first contacted HCAP's Central District Service Center after her work hours were reduced due to COVID-19. Though her husband continued to work full-time, it had become increasingly difficult to provide for their five children with her reduced income. Sheena told Central staff that she had put off her own education and interests in the past to focus on supporting her family, but had always wanted to work in the healthcare field. "Sheena felt it was time to pursue her dreams – she wanted to be a better role model for her children. To show them that furthering their education is achievable and important," said Sheree, Central District Community Services Specialist.



Sheena was referred to the Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services Program and participated in job readiness training. Through Nā Lima Hana, Sheena qualified for tuition assistance to attend the phlebotomy training program at Professional Healthcare Educators. By November 2021, Sheena completed the course and began job searching.

Central District staff continued working with Sheena during her job search and Nā Lima Hana was also able to provide Sheena with the scrub tops and slip-resistant shoes she needed to begin her new career. Since then, Sheena has completed her 30, 60, and 90-day employment milestones. HCAP also provided school supplies to Sheena's children in partnership with Helping Hands Hawai'i's annual Ready to Learn program. Sheena is "ecstatic" to finally be working in her dream career and hopes her success will continue to encourage her children to always reach their goals.

#### Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program

#### **STEM Students Shine at Statewide Robotics Competition**



On December 3, 2022, the Hā Initiative: Creative STEM After-School Program competed at the Hawai'i First Robotics State Competition at the Blaisdell Center in Honolulu. A total of six teams from four STEM Exploration Centers entered the First Lego League competition, including three Explore teams and three Challenge teams.

The Hā Initiative's Challenge Team from Ka'iulani STEM Exploration Center placed 8th out of 51 teams competing in the robot games from across the state. The Explore Teams from both Ka'iulani and Windward STEM Exploration Centers were also honored for their Team Model Builds and Lincoln STEM Exploration Center's Explore Team was honored for Team Poster Design

# PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

#### Weatherization Assistance Program

#### **HCAP Delivers 16 Refrigerators to Kūpuna This Holiday Season**

HCAP's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) team kicked off the Holidays with a mass delivery of refrigerators to residents at the Hale Mohalu senior apartments. Nearly 30 qualifying seniors received services from WAP, an energy-efficiency initiative that assists residents in reducing the cost of their utility expenses by creating energy-efficient homes. In total, 29 seniors received services with 16 residents being eligible for brand-new energy star refrigerators!

WAP staff was on-site to assist kūpuna with the process and gift the residents with goodie bags filled with hygiene supplies as a little token of holiday cheer. The residents were overjoyed to receive their new



energy-saving refrigerators, especially during the holiday season and as the cost of electricity has increased. Keeping up with household utility bills is significant and a key component of self-sustainability. It is the hope of HCAP and the WAP team to enable more individuals and families to have energy-efficient homes.

#### Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center

#### Leeward Community College Students Adopt Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center



Students from the University of Hawai'i Leeward Community College "adopted" HCAP's Kumuhonua Transitional Living Center for Giving Tuesday 2022. As part of a class project focused on serving their community, the students contacted Kumuhonua staff earlier this month to coordinate an effort to help Oʻahu's homeless individuals and families. Kumuhonua staff were happy to invite the group to participate in the center's Giving Tuesday food drive.

The students were able to collect nine bags of nonperishable food donations in the following weeks. On November 30, the students and their instructor, Kumu Laimana, delivered the donations to Kumuhonua. The group was also able to take a brief tour of the center and speak to Kumuhonua staff about their role at HCAP and the various programs and services the agency has to offer.

#### Kūpuna Independent Life Series

#### Kūpuna Independent Life Series Celebrates 10th Anniversary

On October 4, 2022, the Kūpuna Independent Life Series began its 10th year of providing seniors living on the Wai'anae Coast with health education workshops at the Leeward District Service Center. Leeward staff was honored to have two pillars in the Wai'anae community join, Auntie Esmeralda Shelltrak and Auntie Ruby Maunakea, original participating kūpuna who have continued to attend classes over the past ten years. Since 2012, Leeward has retained a fruitful partnership with the HPU College of Nursing and the faculty advisor Monica Magallanes, a Wai'anae HPU graduate who was a student nurse during the first Kūpuna Independent Life Series.



This semester, the health curriculum will focus on the anatomy of laughter and how laughing benefits different parts of the body. The curriculum includes guest speakers, who bring a wealth of knowledge to the kūpuna, arts and crafts, and guest musicians to perform for the kūpuna during the holiday season.

#### Kōkua Food Assistance

#### Employment and Food Assistance Help Central Family Bounce Back from Pandemic Hardships



Earlier this year, Kassydy was completing an online Head Start application when she noticed the Kōkua Food Assistance program on HCAP's list of programs and services. She contacted Central District Service Center to request more information about the program and began sharing her story with the community services staff. Kassydy explained that she is a mother of four young children and had been staying at home with them when the COVID-19 pandemic hit. With her children in distance learning indefinitely, Kassydy was unable to return to work and the family was struggling to get by on her husband's income alone.


Kassydy's family received immediate assistance through Central's emergency food pantry and further assistance buying groceries through the CARES Act-funded Kōkua Food Assistance program. Central District staff also recommended Kassydy for the Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services program to complete job readiness training and prepare to rejoin the workforce. Kassydy has kept in touch with Central District staff throughout her job search. At the end of June, she was offered a job and was able to receive work attire from Nā Lima Hana Employment Core Services





#### Family Engagment

Family Engagement is a collaborative, strengths-based process through which HCAP Head Start & Early Head Start professionals, families, and children build positive and goal-oriented relationships. It is a shared commitment to creating and sustaining ongoing partnerships that support the parent-child relationships that are crucial to a child's healthy development, school readiness, and wellbeing.

Teachers and Family Advocates plan monthly family engagement activities that provide an opportunity for families to learn more about effectively supporting children's growth and development across Head Start & Early Head Start domains.

#### **School Readiness**

The HCAP Head Start & Early Head Start program provides a comprehensive curriculum designed to prepare children for kindergarten. The curriculum aligns the Head Start Early Learning Framework, Hawai'i Early Learning Development Standards, and MyTeachingStrategies to provide developmentally-appropriate practices for kindergarten readiness.

HCAP Head Start & Early Head Start gather data from teacher observations, the Classroom Assessment Scoring System, MyTeachingStrategies, and parent input to provide outcomes for school readiness goals. Using this data, teaching staff are able to tailor specific goals and objectives for each individual child enrolled in the program.






